

The SAVE Act Threatens Every American's Right to Vote

The Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act would require every voter to provide specific citizenship documents, such as a passport or an original birth certificate, in person when registering to vote, updating their registration, or when voting in North Dakota since we don't have voter registration.

Who does it impact?

- Military Voters: A military ID alone wouldn't be enough to prove citizenship.
- **Disaster Victims:** North Dakota has faced 28 federally-declared disasters in the last 20 years, and many victims lose critical documents during disasters.
- **Married Women:** Over 160,000 women in North Dakota have likely changed their last name. These voters would have to provide citizenship documents that match their current legal name, which many don't have.
- **Rural Voters:** A majority of North Dakota counties have just one polling site open on Election Day. This law would make it impossible for many rural voters to cast a ballot who couldn't travel the long distance to show their documents in person.
- Indigenous Voters: North Dakota tribal lands are in rural areas of the state, making it hard to get to a polling site in person not to mention the barriers of the ID requirements of the SAVE Act.
- Anyone without the Required ID: So, millions of Americans.

We already have secure systems in place to ensure only eligible voters cast a ballot. This bill does nothing to improve election integrity—but it does make it harder for millions of Americans to vote.
